Hall of Fame Award

The Crime Prevention Association of New Brunswick established the Hall of Fame Award in 1996 to recognize the commitment of individuals, communities, and organizations who have made significant contribution in the creation of safer communities.

The Association encourages the involvement of the corporate sector, municipalities, police and commissions, provincial government and the general public in the promotion of Crime Prevention.

Community safety is important to us all. We would like to encourage the continued participation and contributions made in your community.

With the knowledge you have of your community, please take a moment to consider those you feel are making a significant contribution.

Recipients must:

- be a resident of New Brunswick or a New Brunswick based organization (profit, non-profit, or volunteer).
- have actively contributed energy, time, talent, resources or support to the planning, implementation, maintenance, enhancement or promotion of crime prevention and safe communities for a minimum of five years.
- have succeeded in rallying support (especially volunteer support) in establishing and maintaining community crime prevention activities that improve the quality of life.
- not be a member of Parliament, the Senate or a member of the Hall of Fame Committee.

Nomination forms and supporting documentation must be received by September 30.

Department of Public Safety Certificate of Recognition

The Crime Prevention Association of NB and the Department of Public Safety recognize Individuals/Community Groups organizations, businesses and police agencies/officers which have made an outstanding contribution to the development, implementation, promotion and/or enhancement of crime prevention and safe communities.

Nominations must include a brief description of the activity that brought about the nomination.

Things to consider:

- Were the Nominee(s)' endeavours sensitive to cultural, linguistic, racial or other minority needs and/or interests?
- Is there other relevant information concerning the individual/ organizations efforts in raising public awareness in achieving community action and creating safer communities.
- Is there any other program involving this individual/organization which would be adaptable to other areas of the province?
- Photocopies of newspaper clippings describing the program or commitment of Nominee(s) would be helpful.

Nomination forms and supporting documentation must be received by September 30.

The Constable Leo "Tyler" Francis Memorial Award

This award was established by the Crime Prevention Association of New Brunswick in honour and memory of the late Constable Tyler Francis, an RCMP officer who demonstrated both a high standard of personal and professional dedication towards crime prevention.

This award is presented to police officers and peace officers who have been involved in crime prevention initiatives in their community for at least five years and have demonstrated significant personal and professional commitment in the function of these duties.

Nominations must:

- describe the contributions the nominee has made to crime prevention.
- Include copies of newspaper articles if available
- any further information the committee should have in making their decision.
